



By Gender, Race/Ethnicity, Age Group, Jurisdiction, and Over Time <u>Mobile version</u>





Notes and disclaimers: The City of Berkeley and Alameda County (minus Berkeley) are separate local health jurisdictions (LHJs). We are showing data for each separately and together. The numbers for the Alameda County LHJ and the Berkeley LHJ come from the state's communicable disease tracking database, CalREDIE. These data are updated daily, with cases sometimes reassigned to other LHJs and sometimes changed from a suspected to a confirmed case, so counts for a particular date in the past may change as information is updated in CalREDIE. Case dates reflect the date created in CalREDIE. The time lag between the date of death and the date of entry into CalREDIE has sometimes been one week; the date of death is what is reflected here, and so death counts





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





Counts and Capacity Over Time Mobile version




#### Alameda County Hospitalizations COVID-19 Dashboard










# California's Blueprint for a Safer Economy

### **Tier Framework**

- On August 28<sup>th</sup>, the State replaced the County Monitoring List framework with a color-coded fourtier Blueprint for a Safer Economy
- The Blueprint revises criteria for loosening and tightening restrictions on activities
- The new indicators capture disease burden and testing
  - If metrics fall across tiers, county placed in the most restrictive tier
- A third health equity measure is pending




### **County Status**

- Alameda County is currently in the Purple Tier, indicating widespread risk
- CDPH will assess where counties are on these indicators weekly
- A county will remain in a tier for a minimum of three weeks before being able to advance to a later tier
- A county can only move forward one tier at a time, even if metrics qualify for a more advanced tier

9.1 New COVID-19 Positive cases per day per 100K



### Alameda County COVID-19 Daily Case Rate, 2020




—New cases adjusted for testing rate —New cases per 100,000 per day, 7-day average, by episode date

### **Impact on Activities and Businesses**

- The Blueprint alters reopening plans for some businesses and activities opening some that had been prohibited and imposing new standards on others
- For example, counties in the Widespread (purple) tier can open:
  - Retail stores and malls with restrictions and at maximum 25% capacity
  - Grocery stores at 50% capacity
  - Hair salons and barbershops indoors with restrictions
- Local Health Officers can be more restrictive than the State

# **Shelter in Place Update**



### **Schools Update**

- Counties in the Purple Tier are not permitted to open for in-person learning, but may accept waivers to allow in-person elementary school learning
- HCSA administered In-Person Learning Readiness Questionnaire to assess interest in applying for elementary school waivers and barriers to full in-person learning
- For any in-person learning, schools and districts will need to develop reopening plans that address disinfection, cohorting, health screenings, contact tracing, testing of all staff
- Districts are encouraged to utilize the State's guidance for Small Cohorts/Groups
  of Children and Youth to serve highest needs students

### **Shelter in Place Order Update**

- As of 9/4/20, Alameda County Shelter in Place orders aligned with a limited selection of allowable Purple
  Tier activities
  - Sectors previously allowed by Alameda County, now aligned with State's new, more restrictive measures:
    - retail stores with a 25% capacity limit
    - grocery stores with a 50% capacity limit
    - indoor malls, with a new 25% capacity restriction and continued mandatory closure of food courts and public congregation points
  - Sectors previously allowed by Alameda County, newly authorized to operate indoors:
    - Hair salons and barbershops in accordance with state guidance
  - Outdoor recreational activities, which were previously allowed by Alameda County, are clarified by new guidance:
    - Outdoor dance classes as part of outdoor non-contact fitness classes
    - Mini-golf, batting cages, driving rages, and kart racing, as allowed by the State's Family Entertainment Center Guidance
    - Shared play structures continue to be closed, including bounce houses, ball pits and playgrounds
- As of 9/14/20, updates to the Health Officer Order allowing vehicle-based gatherings will:
  - permit live performances (guidance forthcoming)
  - increase the maximum number of vehicles allowed from 200 to 400
  - permit the sale of concessions at events with restrictions
- Other allowable Purple Tier activities are still not permitted in Alameda County at this time.








Flu vaccines could be a dry run for upcoming coronavirus immunizations



### Flu Vaccine Supply

- ~90% of flu vaccine is administered by health care providers, pharmacies, employers, etc.
- Local public health departments administer
   <10% of flu vaccine, prioritizing high-risk and uninsured populations</li>
- Alameda County Public Health expects more vaccine this year
  - 26,000 expected in October
  - 41,000 expected in November or December

### **Flu Vaccine Clinics**

No one is experienced in socially distanced "mass" clinics



- Prep Mod App (for staff & general public)
- Appointment-based
- Paperless
- Screened at door
- Outdoor if possible (much more resource intense)
- Drive through
- During food pick-up
- At COVID test sites (though not recommended by CDPH)
- All doses entered into immunization registry (CAIR)
- All options on the table







### Planning Underway for Increased Flu Vaccine Distribution

- Convening community partners within the next 2 weeks to plan for targeted and wide distribution
- Flu vaccine distribution is practice for COVID vaccine distribution
  - Establish infrastructure for appointments and self sign-ups
  - Clinics in the heart of hardest hit COVID zip codes
  - Clinics co-located with trusted community partners
  - Vaccine for skilled nursing facilities or long-term care facilities
  - Partnership with the Board of Supervisors
  - Trust building and coordinated messaging
