



By Gender, Race/Ethnicity, Age Group, Jurisdiction, and Over Time Mobile version








Counts and Capacity Over Time Mobile version




Alameda County Hospitalizations COVID-19 Dashboard

California's Blueprint for a Safer Economy

- On August 28th, the State replaced the County Monitoring List framework with a color-coded four-tier **Blueprint for a** Safer Economy
- The Blueprint **revises criteria** for loosening and tightening restrictions on activities
- Metrics for tier movement
 - new cases
 - rate of positive tests
 - health equity metric started on October 6
- Local Health Jurisdictions can be more restrictive than the State




Alameda County in the Red Tier

- On 9/22, Alameda County moved into the Red Tier, indicating substantial risk
- A county must remain in a tier for **a minimum** of three weeks before being able to advance to a later tier
- A county can **only move forward one tier at a time**, even if metrics qualify for a more advanced tier




Health Equity Metric

- County census tracts divided into quartiles based on California Healthy Places Index (a composite measure of socioeconomic opportunity)
- County performance to be measured on whether the tier threshold for percentage of positive tests is met both in the county as a whole and also in the lowest socioeconomic quartile
- Implemented on October 6
- Measure is required only to advance in the tier structure; will not be utilized to determine tier regression






High Poverty




HPI Quartile 1



Community Testing Sites and Overall COVID-19 Case Rate









Alameda County COVID-19 Daily Case Rate, 2020



Alameda County LHJ COVID-19 daily case rates, HPI quartile 1, 7-day rolling average, 2020








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Alameda County LHJ COVID-19 daily case rates, 7-day rolling average, 2020










Alameda County COVID-19 Testing, 2020


Alameda County LHJ test rates per 100,000 residents, HPI quartile 1, 7day rolling average, 2020



Alameda County COVID-19 Test Positivity, 2020



Alameda County LHJ percent of tests with positive result, HPI quartile 1, 7-day rolling average, 2020







Alameda County Shelter in Place Order

- Effective 10/9, Alameda County authorized opening of several Red Tier Activities
- Effective 10/13, elementary school students may resume in-person education
- <u>A complete list of activities permitted in Alameda County</u> is available on our COVID website
- We are Monitoring **metrics to ensure stability**
- We have **phased reopening plan** that balances increased risk of spread of COVID-19 from newly permitted activities alongside appropriate mitigation strategies


Schools Reopening – Allowed in Red Tier

- Elementary schools may resume in-person education 10/13
 - Replaces waiver process
- Middle and High School reopening anticipated in 4-12 weeks
- Key Factors
 - County case rate, test positivity, and overall numbers of students and staff
- Other Permitted In-Person Educational Activities
 - Juvenile detention, psychiatric facility and crisis housing education
 - Students with individualized education plans.
 - Testing and Assessment
 - Small cohorts for distance learning, etc



Schools Guidance

- ACOE/HCSA requiring reopening plans
 - In-depth review not required
- Daily health screenings
- Small, stable cohorts of students
- Face coverings and physical distance
- Controlled movement within schools
- Regular cleaning and maximize fresh air
- Work with ACPHD on contact tracing

Schools Testing

- All symptomatic and exposed persons should be tested
- Staff screening recommended at least monthly
 - Monitor for asymptomatic COVID
 - ACOE has a contract with a testing provider
 - Commercial insurance must cover testing for essential education workers
- Screening of asymptomatic students
 - Some experts have recommended
 - Optimal strategy unclear
 - Substantial operational challenges







Schools and Equity

- Substantial uncertainty about the long-term equity impacts of schools remaining closed versus opening
- Students from less well-resourced districts and neighborhoods may experience disproportionate impacts from prolonged closure
- Low overall case rates and decreased transmission in our most impacted neighborhoods is most important factor guiding all reopenings
- Unclear what the impacts of school reopening on transmission will be
- Difficult to manage COVID shelter-in-place rules at city or district level






Schools Reclosure Criteria

- Worsening overall case rates and test positivity most important
- CDPH School Closure Guidance
 - Classroom closure and quarantine if 5% of students and staff positive
 - School closure and quarantine if 5% of students and staff positive
 - District closure if 1 in 4 schools closed




- **5 priority neighborhoods** with highest health disparities, aligned with health equity metric
 - West Oakland, Fruitvale/San Antonio, East Oakland, Ashland/Cherryland, South Hayward
- Testing Supports
 - Total of \$7.6M allocated to these sites to date
- Case Investigation and Contact Tracing (CI/CT)
 - 4 providers currently conducting CI/CT (Public Health Department and 3 clinics)
 - \$940,000 allocated for 4 immediate action contracts with community clinics (\$235,000 each)
 - 43 proposals received to date (10/2/20) for CI/CT Community Partner \$14 million expansion RFQ
- Outreach/Health Education
 - Social Marketing Consulting Contract for \$100k executed to lay foundation for social marketing campaign.
 - \$24,000 in youth stipends
 - "Crush the Curve" 7 Bay Area County youth social marketing campaign with youth-serving organizations
 - Street outreach to businesses


