

COVID-19 Vaccination Record

Showing Proof of Full Vaccination Status in California



California reopened on June 15, and many restrictions were lifted, such as capacity limitations and physical distancing requirements. In certain settings, Californians may be required to show proof of being fully vaccinated.¹

How can I prove my vaccination status?

When you receive a COVID-19 vaccine, your vaccine provider issues you an original *Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) Vaccination Record Card*.

This card includes your full name, date of birth, type of vaccine provided, lot number, date of last dose administered, and site where your vaccine was provided.

Here are ways to prove your vaccination status:

- Original *COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card*
- A photo of your *Vaccination Record Card*
- A paper copy of your *Vaccination Record Card*
- A photo of your *Vaccination Record Card* stored on a cell phone or other electronic device
- A copy of your Vaccination Record from your healthcare provider
- [Digital COVID-19 Vaccine Record](#) (DCVR)

The DCVR portal pulls COVID-19 vaccine records from California's vaccination systems. It allows you to access and download a digital copy of your COVID-19 vaccination record.



Contact your vaccination provider for copies of your COVID-19 Vaccination Record.

- For most vaccinations administered in California, vaccine data is entered into California's Immunization Information System (also known as [CA Immunization Registry2](#) or CAIR2). A copy of your record may be requested from CAIR2 via phone, email, or an [online form](#).
- If you were vaccinated through your healthcare provider, you can request copies of your COVID-19 Vaccination Record from the provider.
- If you received the COVID-19 vaccine at a federal facility (such as Department of Defense, Indian Health Services, or Veterans Affairs), you will need to request a vaccine record from that facility directly. The information is not submitted to or documented in the California Immunization Registry2 (CAIR2).

¹People are considered fully vaccinated 2 weeks after their second dose in a 2-dose series, such as the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, or 2 weeks after a single-dose vaccine, such as the J & J vaccine. The vaccines must be authorized either by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) or World Health Organization (WHO).
